# We remember, we celebrate, we believe

To the Clergy, Religious and Laity of the Archdiocese of Miami

My dear friends:

Our Golden Jubilee Celebration is inaugurated on Oct. 7, 2007, the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, the beginning of a yearlong festivity to culminate on Oct. 7, 2008, our 50th anniversary, the foundational date of origin of the Archdiocese of Miami.

The centerpiece of the Mass of this feast is Mary's Magnificat sung at the responsorial psalm. In it, Mary gives thanks and praise to God for "the almighty has done great things for me, holy is his name."

With that same song of gratitude in our hearts, the people of the Archdiocese of Miami remember

and give thanks for the great things God has done over 50 years for us and for those who went before us. Gratitude is a natural virtue that recognizes and appreciates what one has, what one has received from others. It becomes a supernatural virtue when we refer all that we have and all that we have received to God as the source of all that we are.

At the beginning of the jubilee year, as sons and daughters of God, we sing praises of gratitude to the God and Father of all, to Jesus Christ the Son of God, and to the Holy Spirit who dwells in our midst and who has guided the work of our hands for these five decades.

- On Oct. 7, 1958, the Diocese of Miami was established and Bishop Coleman F.

**TEACHING TOOL**

Practical uses of pastoral letter

1. Parents should read it to learn the spiritual history of the Archdiocese of Miami
2. Parents should teach it to their children
3. Catholic schools and religious education programs should include this pastoral letter as a teaching tool about our Catholic roots and history of the church in south Florida.

Carroll was installed as its first bishop. Pope Pius XII died the day after the installation, Oct. 8, 1958.

- The Diocese of Miami was only the second diocese in Florida. Since 1868, the Diocese of St. Augustine had encompassed practically the whole state.
- Those in attendance for Bishop Car-

roll's installation in the newly designated St. Mary Cathedral: Archbishop Joseph P. Hurley of St. Augustine; Archbishop Francis P. Keough of Baltimore; and Bishop John Dearden of Pittsburgh (in December of 1958 he became archbishop of Detroit and later cardinal).

**WITH GRATITUDE WE REMEMBER:**

- 63 diocesan and 21 religious order priests and 392 religious women serving in the new diocese in 1958.
- 185,000 lay Catholics in 1958.
- 16 counties in 1958: Broward, Charlotte, Collier, Dade, DeSoto, Glades, Hardee, Hendry, Highland, Indian River,

Lee, Martin, Monroe, Okeechobee, Palm Beach, and St. Lucie.

**WITH GRATITUDE WE REMEMBER:**

- Many priests, moved by the Spirit to take up the mission of the cross, who came here from Ireland and Spain to serve the growing population here. Very few native-born clergy were among Bishop Carroll's co-workers.

- Among the missionary priests from Ireland who came here in the early years were: Msgr. Dominic Barry, Father James Connaughton, Msgr. Francis Dunleavy,

• A large number of our religious women at the time were Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine, Florida's oldest religious community. (They were first invited to minister here in 1866 by Bishop Augustin Verot, Florida's first bishop.)

## WITH GRATITUDE WE REMEMBER:

• Four years after the establishment of the diocese, the Second Vatican Council was convened, on Oct. 11, 1962, and Bishop Carroll attended as one of the Council Fathers.

• Vatican II documents would shape the church and serve as a blueprint for developing future policies for the new diocese.

## WITH GRATITUDE WE REMEMBER:

• "Lumen Gentium" ("Dogmatic Constitution on the Church") and "Apostolicam Actuositatem" ("Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity"), Vatican II documents that speak of the role of the laity in the church.

• "Christifidelis Laici" ("Christ's Faithful People"), the 1988 apostolic exhortation that followed the first world synod of bishops in 1987.

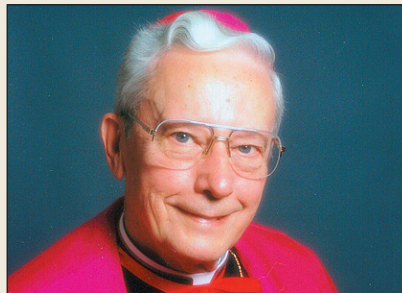
• These documents were the foundation stone for lay men and women to take a large share in the work of the church

and led to the development of lay spirituality movements to form and support the spiritual lives of the laity. Today, we have around 75 movements in the Archdiocese of Miami.

## WITH GRATITUDE WE REMEMBER:

• Wave after wave of exiles and immigrants from every nation in Latin America, from Europe and Africa, from China and Asia, who constantly challenge us to grow in charity and live up to the Gospel mandate "to shelter the homeless and welcome the stranger."

• Organizations that arose to serve newly arrived immigrants: *Centro Hispano Católico*, Operation *Pedro Pan* (Unaccompanied Minors Program), Shrine of Our Lady of Charity, Pierre Toussaint Haitian Catholic Center, Ministry to Cultural Groups and Catholic Legal Services.

• Challenges of multicultural liturgies: Spanish Masses were added in many parishes after the last English Mass on Sundays; Mass was celebrated in French in many Broward parishes to accommodate the Canadians during the winter tourist season; Mass is now regularly celebrated

in more than a dozen languages throughout the archdiocese.

## WITH GRATITUDE WE REMEMBER:

• The rapid growth of Miami, which 10 years after its founding, on June 13, 1968, became an archdiocese with Bishop Coleman Carroll as the Metropolitan Archbishop of the Province of Miami, which encompasses all seven dioceses in the state of Florida.

• Two new dioceses created at the same time: St. Petersburg (June 17, 1968) and Orlando (June 18, 1968).

• The Pensacola-Tallahassee Diocese, established Nov. 6, 1975, with Bishop Rene H. Gracida, Miami's second auxiliary bishop, as its founding bishop.

• The development of multicultural

pastoral care throughout the Archdiocese of Miami under the visionary leadership of Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy.

• Development of the permanent diaconate in 1976.

• Development of the lay ministry formation program in 1977, with Dr. Mercedes Scopetta as the founding director.

• Creation of the dioceses of Palm Beach (Oct. 24, 1984) and Venice (Oct. 25, 1984), with Miami Auxiliary Bishop John Nevins as founding bishop of Venice.

• First archdiocesan Synod, 1985-1988.

• Visit of the Holy Father, Sept. 10-11, 1987.

**SEMINARIES**



St. John Vianney College Seminary

- St. John Vianney College Seminary, opened 1959 as a high school seminary, the first minor seminary in the southeastern United States; currently a college seminary serving dioceses in Florida, other U.S. states and the Caribbean.
- St. Vincent de Paul Regional Seminary, opened 1963 as the only major seminary south of Baltimore on the east coast; currently serves dioceses in North America, the Caribbean, South and Central America.
- Both seminaries are highly recognized for providing bilingual, multicultural training to future priests since the early 1970s.

- Barry University, founded in 1940 as Barry College, the first Catholic college for women in Florida, operated by the Dominican Sisters of Adrian, Mich.
- St. Thomas University, founded in 1961 as Biscayne College by Augustinian Friars who had been expelled from Santo Tomás de Villanueva University in Cuba. The name was changed to St. Thomas in 1984. In 1988, St. Thomas became Florida's only archdiocese-sponsored university.

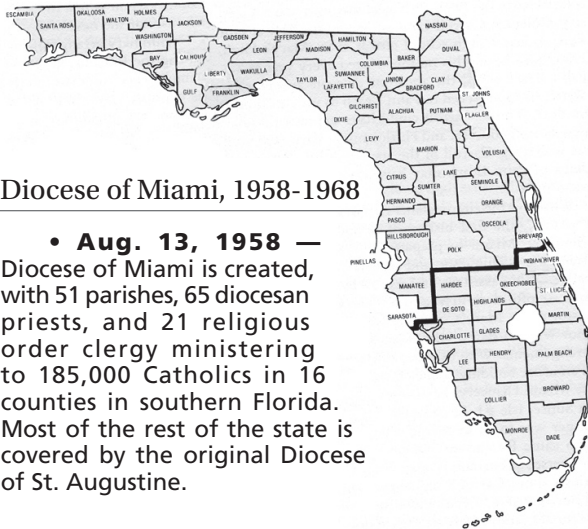

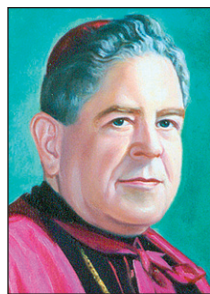

# Archdiocese of Miami



Diocese of Miami, 1958-1968

• **Aug. 13, 1958** — Diocese of Miami is created, with 51 parishes, 65 diocesan priests, and 21 religious order clergy ministering to 185,000 Catholics in 16 counties in southern Florida. Most of the rest of the state is covered by the original Diocese of St. Augustine.

• **Oct. 7, 1958** — Bishop Coleman F. Carroll, formerly auxiliary bishop of Pittsburgh, is installed as first bishop of Miami.

• **March 20, 1959** — The diocesan newspaper, *The Voice*, publishes its first edition, including a page in Spanish which in 1982 grew to become a separate Spanish newspaper, *La Voz Católica*. (*The Voice* merged with the *Florida Catholic* in November 1990).



St. John Vianney Minor Seminary, Miami

• **September 1959** — First minor seminary in southeastern United States, St. John Vianney College Seminary, is established in Miami.

• **1959-1963** — Tremendous program of expansion, due to influx of Cuban refugees as well as Catholics from the northern United States. The diocese bears the brunt of the Cuban exile exodus for a full year prior to receiving federal government assistance.

## 10 YEARS

• **June 13, 1968** — Ecclesiastical Province of Miami is established: Diocese of Miami is elevated to the rank of archdiocese and two new Florida dioceses are created, Orlando and St. Petersburg; Florida now is divided into four Catholic dioceses including St. Augustine. Miami yields eight counties to the new dioceses.

• **Oct. 7, 1968** — On its 10th anniversary, the Miami Archdiocese consists of 85 parishes and 10 missions in eight counties. A Catholic population of 400,000 is served by 164 diocesan priests, 141 religious order clergy and about 900 women religious. The diocese's Radio and TV Department is the first diocesan agency in the nation to inaugurate closed-circuit TV to schools and churches.

• **Sept. 17, 1976** — Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy, a native of Cincinnati and founding bishop of Phoenix, arrives in Miami as coadjutor with right of succession to Archbishop Coleman Carroll.

• **July 26, 1977** — Archbishop Carroll dies and Archbishop McCarthy succeeds.

## 25 YEARS

• **1983** — On its 25th anniversary, which is celebrated Dec. 8 with a Mass at the Orange Bowl, the eight-county archdiocese includes more than 896,000 Catholics, with 135 parishes and three missions, served by 312 diocesan and 210 religious order priests; 643 women religious and 63 men religious; and 45 permanent deacons. In April, the archdiocesan staff moves into its new home at the Pastoral Center in Miami Shores.

• **1984** — The Kenedy Directory lists the Archdiocese of Miami as the second-fastest-growing see in the nation.

• **July 17, 1984** — The Archdiocese of Miami is divided once more, yielding Palm Beach and Martin counties to the newly created Diocese of Palm Beach; and Glades, Hendry and Collier counties to the newly created Diocese of Venice. Now, the Archdiocese of Miami consists of three counties, Dade, Broward and Monroe, with more than 527,000 registered Catholics served by 100 parishes, two missions, 279 diocesan priests, 164 religious order priests, 445 women religious, 63 men religious and 55 permanent deacons.

• **1985** — Archbishop McCarthy convokes the first-ever Archdiocesan Synod and the first synod in Florida in 28 years. The synod's goal is to renew the life of the church in south Florida and plan for the 21st century.

• **Sept. 10-11, 1987** — Pope John Paul II visits Miami.

## 30 YEARS

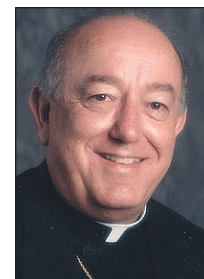
• **Oct. 7, 1988** — On its 30th anniversary, the archdiocese numbers more than 596,000 registered Catholics in 105 parishes and three missions. They are served by 177 diocesan priests, 146 religious order priests, 432 women religious, 58 men religious and 72 permanent deacons.

• **Dec. 4-9, 1991** — In preparation for the 500th anniversary of the arrival of Christianity in the New World, the archdiocese hosts a Festival of Faith at the Miami Beach Convention Center. The festival features information booths and exhibits by representatives of all the parishes, institutions and groups in the archdiocese, daily Masses and opportunity for prayer and confession.

• **Aug. 24, 1992** — Hurricane Andrew, the first Category 5 storm to hit a highly populated urban area in the United States, strikes south Florida, wreaking vast damage on the southernmost part of Dade County. The damage to Catholic facilities is estimated at \$25 million.

• **April 10, 1993** — At the Vatican-mandated age of 75, Archbishop McCarthy submits his resignation to Pope John Paul II, but continues to run the archdiocese until the Holy See appoints a successor. The archdiocese now consists of 107 parishes and three missions in three counties, with a registered Catholic population of more than 681,000 served by 198 diocesan priests, 127 religious order priests, 406 women religious and 56 men religious, and 103 permanent deacons.

• **Nov. 3, 1994** — Bishop John Clement Favalora, a native of New Orleans who has served as bishop of St. Petersburg since 1989, is appointed to succeed retired Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy as archbishop of Miami.

• **Dec. 20, 1994** — Archbishop Favalora is installed as the third archbishop of Miami during a ceremony at St. Mary Cathedral. To accommodate the many people who could not attend the cathedral ceremony, a public Mass of welcome for the new archbishop is offered at the Miami Beach Convention Center in January 1995.

# IMELINE

• **May 27-28, 1995** — Cardinal Jaime Ortega of Havana, Cuba makes an official pastoral visit to south Florida, celebrating Mass at St. Mary Cathedral, vespers at the Shrine of Our Lady of Charity on Biscayne Bay, and an outdoor Mass at St. Thomas University in Miami.

• **May 1997** — Archbishop Favalora makes a pastoral visit to Haiti, accompanying members of the archdiocesan lay missionary organization, *Amor en Acción* (Love in Action).

• **November 1997** — Archbishop Favalora travels to Rome to take part in the Synod of Bishops for America. Upon his return, a project begins to take shape: *En Comuni3n*. Officially established in 2000 as a means of fostering communication and reconciliation among Cuban clergy and laity in the United States and on the island, *En Comuni3n* also promotes the delivery of humanitarian aid to Cuba and an outreach to help newly arrived Cubans feel welcome in south Florida parishes.

• **Jan. 25, 1998** — Archbishop Favalora leads a group of about 180 pilgrims on a nine-hour visit to Havana, Cuba, to attend Pope John Paul II's Mass in the civic plaza.

## 40 YEARS

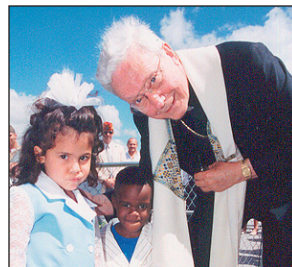
• **Oct. 7, 1998** — On the 40th anniversary of its establishment, the Archdiocese of Miami consists of 108 parishes and three missions in three counties, with a registered Catholic population of more than 774,000 served by 265 diocesan priests, 122 religious order priests, 345 women religious and 56 men religious and 128 permanent deacons.

• **September 1999** — Archbishop Favalora announces plans for Vision 2000, a campaign to generate a \$75 million endowment that will enable the church in south Florida to continue its educational and charitable ministries into the 21st century. Vision 2000 ultimately raises \$110 million in pledges.

• **January 2000** — Archbishop Favalora issues his first pastoral letter, "The Great Jubilee Year 2000," to mark the beginning of the second millennium of the Christian era.

• **January 2001** — A second pastoral letter, "The Star of Bethlehem," issued to mark the end of the Jubilee Year, calls for the establishment of: an archdiocesan Missions Office to coordinate a "comprehensive program of missionary presentations and appeals in every parish of the archdiocese"; a mission committee in every parish; and a chapter of the Holy Childhood Society in every Catholic elementary school and religious education program.

• **July 2003** — In response to the sexual abuse crisis that enveloped the U.S. Catholic Church, and in keeping with the U.S. bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children, Archbishop Favalora creates the Safe Environment Office. Its role is threefold: to assist victims of past sexual abuse; to implement Virtus and Teaching Touching Safety programs that train archdiocesan clergy, religious and laity, as well as children, to spot potential abusers and prevent abuse; and to conduct periodic background checks on all staff and volunteers who work with children.



• **June 7, 2005** — Archbishop Emeritus Edward A. McCarthy dies in his sleep at the age of 87.

• On its 50th anniversary, the Archdiocese of Miami has 111 parishes, three missions and more than 820,000 registered Catholics in Miami-Dade, Broward and Monroe counties. The Catholic population is served by 263 diocesan priests, 89 religious order priests, 160 permanent deacons, 300 women religious and 50 men religious.

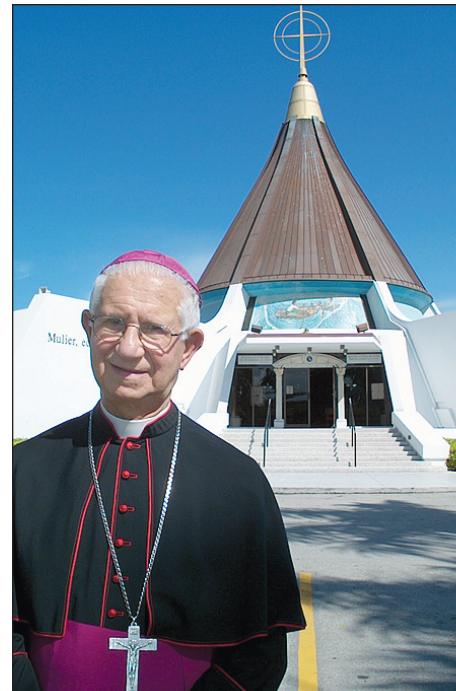
