Requirements to be a foster parent

- · Be at least 21 years of age;
- Be able to provide adequate bedroom space and a separate bed for each foster child;
- Have reliable transportation;
- Be willing to participate in a 30-hour free training;
- Be prepared for adults in your household to undergo complete background check;
- Be able to meet basic resources to support the household.



SUPPORT TO FOSTER PARENTS

- 24-hour case management
- Monthly stipend to help with the caring of the refugee minor or youth.
- Continuing education
